

Pope Francis calls faithful married love 'revolutionary'.

Vatican City, Oct 31, 2018 / 04:48 am (CNA/EWTN News) - Faithful married love, in which a husband loves his wife like Christ loves the Church, is "revolutionary," Pope Francis said Wednesday.



The pope focused his remarks at the general audience on spousal fidelity in every vocation.

"A call to love ... manifests itself in fidelity," Pope Francis said Oct. 31 in St. Peter's Square.

"This letter of St. Paul is revolutionary to say a husband should love like Christ loves the Church," the pope continued, in a departure from his prepared remarks. "It's a revolution. Always on the way of love."

Pope Francis' comments came as a part of a weekly catechesis on the Ten Commandments. This Wednesday, the pope reflected on the Sixth Commandment, "Do not commit adultery."

"Who then is the adulterer, the lustful, the unfaithful?" asked the pope. "He is an immature person, who ... interprets situations based on his own well-being and satisfaction."

"The human body is not an instrument of pleasure, but the place of our call to love, and in authentic love there is no room for lust and for its superficiality. Men and women deserve more!" he continued.

"This command is for everyone, it is a paternal Word of God addressed to every man and woman," the pope said.

"Let us remember that the path of human maturity is the path itself of love that goes from receiving care to the ability to offer care, from receiving life to the ability to give life," he added

The Holy Father stated twice, "every Christian vocation is spousal."

"In the priesthood one loves God's people with all the paternity, tenderness and strength of a husband and a father," the pope explained.

"The Church does not need aspirants to the role of priests, but men to whom the Holy Spirit touches the heart with unconditional love for the Bride of Christ." he said.

We start from Christ's "fidelity, his tenderness, his generosity," Pope Francis said, and from there "we look with faith at marriage and every vocation, and we understand the full meaning of sexuality."

St. Josephat



St. Josaphat was born of Orthodox parents in the Polish region of Lithuania in about the year of 1580. It is said that, when he was a child, while he was learning about the sufferings of our Lord Jesus, his heart became wounded by an arrow from the sacred side of the Crucified. In 1604, he was admitted to the Ukranian Order of St. Basil where he lived as a monk. In 1614, he was elected archmandrite

of Vilna, Russia; and by 1618 he became archbishop of Poltzk. As archbishop, he worked tirelessly to bring part of the Orthodox Church into union with Rome. He faced much opposition even among Catholics in his community that he looked to for support. They didn't agree with his insistence on the use of the Byzantine rite, also known as the Greek rite, in place of the Roman rite. St. Josaphat predicted his assassination by his opponents and even spoke of it in a sermon describing his death as immanent. He was killed by an angry Russian mob who beat him with a stick, killed him with an axe and then threw his bloody dead body into a nearby river. During this horrible act of violence, some of the Jewish community risked their lives by rescuing the friends and servants of St. Josaphat. He was canonized a saint by Rome in 1867 and became the first saint of the Eastern churches. He is the Patron Saint of Ukraine, and his feast day is November 12th.

Prayer to St. Josaphat

Lord, fill your Church with the Spirit that gave Saint Josaphat courage to lay down his life for his people. By his prayers may your Spirit make us strong and willing to offer our lives for our brothers and sisters. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.



St. Frances Xavier Cabrini

St. Frances Xavier Cabrini, later known as Mother Cabrini, was the youngest of thirteen children and was born 2 months premature on July 15, 1850 with the birth name of Maria Francesca Cabrini. She was born in a village near the city of Milan, Italy called S'ant Angelo Lodigiano. Sadly, only 3 of her siblings lived past adolescence; and she lived most of her life in poor health. She was educated at an early

age by a school run by the Daughters of the Sacred Heart. She graduated and received her teaching certificate from there; but she was denied admittance to join the Daughters of the Sacred Heart due to her frail health. But a priest requested that she teach at the House of Providence Orphanage in Cadagono, Italy. Thus, she taught at the all-girl school for 6 years and inspired women in the community there to live a religious way of life. She took her vows in 1877 and added Xavier to her name in honor of St. Francis Xavier. In 1880 she founded the Institute of Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus where 7 homes, a school and a nursery were established. She wanted to continue her mission in China, but Pope Leo XIII directed her to go in the opposite direction to the U.S. instead where many Italian Catholic immigrants needed her help and guidance. From the start of her arrival to the U.S. she endured many hardships and disappointments; but she and 7 of her sisters persevered and founded the orphanage which was known as St. Cabrini Home in West Park, New York. She had a deep trust in God which enabled her to establish 67 institutions which consisted of orphanages, schools and hospitals. She died on Dec. 22, 1917 at the age of 67 from complications from dysentery.

Prayer to St. Frances Xavier Cabrini

Fortify me with the grace of Your Holy Spirit and give Your peace to my soul that I may be free from all needless anxiety, solicitude and worry. Help me to desire always that which is pleasing and acceptable to You so that Your will may be my will.
